

# **Federal vote intention**

27 October to 2 November, 2023

# **Key findings**

- The Labor Party retains its lead on two-party preferred vote, but this has weakened in recent months (now at 53.5 to 46.5).
- The Albanese Labor government leads with most major groups of voters, and is particularly strong with younger voters, those with a university education, and who speak a language other than English at home. However, 22 per cent of younger voters are not sure if the government is focused on the right priorities, and juse 30 per cent of those who speak a language other than English at home agree that it is.
- More voters agree that the Albanese government has the right priorities than the Dutton-led opposition (36 versus 30 per cent), with more undecided about the opposition (20 per cent for the opposition, compared with 14 per cent for the government).
- Labor voters are also more likely to agree that the Albanese government has the right priorities than Coalition voters are to say the opposition is ready for government (71 per cent versus 63 per cent).
- However, soft and undecided voters are somewhat less certain the government is focused on the right things. Those whose vote is less certain are slightly more likely to say the Dutton-led Coalition is ready for government than that the Albanese-led Labor Party has the right priorities (26 versus 22 per cent).



# Methodology

The fieldwork was conducted between 27 October and 02 November 2023, with the sample of N = 1,205 Australian citizens aged 18 and older who were enrolled to vote. All respondents were recruited over online panel to fill quotas based on age, gender, location (AEC region), education and vote at the 2022 federal election. Rim weighting was used to apply interlocking weights for age, gender, education and location. The efficiency for these were weights was 93 per cent, providing an effective sample size of 1125.

Based on this effective sample size, the margin of error (95 per cent confidence interval) for a 50 per cent result on the full sample is  $\pm 2.9$  per cent.

This is larger for subsets of the data, such as age or language spoken at home, and results based on these and similar breakdowns should be interpreted conservatively.

Vote intention questions were located immediately after demographic items and other questions used for screening and quotas. Preferences were allocated based on the flows from the 2022 federal election.

Undecided respondents were asked a leaner question. Those who refused to or were unable to provide a vote intention in both the initial question and leaner made up 12 per cent of the sample, and were excluded from published vote intention figures.




Figure 1: Vote intention for the House of Representatives, by individual characteristics.




Figure 2: Share of voters who agree and disagree that the Albanese government is focused on the right priorities, by vote intention and location.




Figure 3: Share of soft and undecided voters, versus those more certain of their decision, who agree and disagree that the Albanese government is focused on the right priorities. Soft and undecided voters here are those who required a prompt to provide their vote intention, were still unable to select an option for whom they would vote when prompted with a leaner, or who had changed their vote choice since the last election.




Figure 4: Share of voters who agree and disagree that the Albanese government is focused on the right priorities, by individual characteristics.




Figure 5: Share of voters who agree and disagree that the Coalition led by Peter Dutton is ready for Government, by vote intention and location.




Figure 6: Share of soft and undecided voters, versus those more certain of their decision, who agree and disagree that the Coalition led by Peter Dutton is ready for Government. Soft and undecided voters here are those who required a prompt to provide their vote intention, were still unable to select an option for whom they would vote when prompted with a leaner, or who had changed their vote choice since the last election.




Figure 7: Share of voters who agree and disagree that the Coalition led by Peter Dutton is ready for Government, by individual characteristics.
